


- Not safe to share:

Creating a Positive Online Community

- NEVER reveal private information
- DON'T tag friends in photos or videos without permission
- Only communicate with people you know offline
- ONLY visit sites that are safe & appropriate

Terms to Know

- target: a person who is the object of an intentional action.
- offender: a person who has a malicious intent to hurt or damage someone.
- bystander: a person who does nothing when they witness something happening.
- upstander: a person who supports and stands up for someone else.

How do you deal with Cyberbullying?

- Build a support network for your children.
- Encourage kids to stand up to the bully-or at least to stand with the victim of cyberbullying.
- Be strategic in your support
 - LISTEN
 - Show "blocking" features

When someone is mean to your child online...

from Common Sense Media curriculum: Grades 3-5, Unit 1

S...step away from the computer
T...tell a TRUSTED adult
O...okay sites first
P...pause and think while online

Digital Footprint & Internet Safety

- Make sure sites have age appropriate language & activities
- Bookmark sites for them to access
- Ensure they are not sharing private information
- Read Terms of Agreement
- Set a positive example
- Set expectations for online behavior
- Establish consequences if rules are broken

Cyberbullying


Signs of Cyberbullying

- Child acts nervous when reading texts, etc.
- Child stops using technology
- Child withdraws

Handling a Cyberbully

Ignore

- Block and/or report
- Save evidence
